Founded in 2011, the Latino Academy has been an independent 501c3 nonprofit organization since 2022.

Its education and training offerings include <u>Commercial Drivers License (CDL)</u> and other <u>employment training</u>, <u>adult education</u>, <u>women's workplace mentorship</u>, and <u>financial education</u>.

Located in Madison, Wisconsin, the Latino Academy has over 20 staff and an operating budget of over \$2 million.

In 2022, the Latino Academy delivered 6,264 hours of instruction and support services to 2,249 individuals, initiating 201 career pathways and awarding 151 industry recognized credentials.

The Executive Director is the organization's chief executive officer. The position's responsibilities include hiring staff (currently 20+ people) and supervising the management team, managing the organization's budget (over \$2 million), ensuring the successful operation of the office, and guiding the development and execution of the organization's strategic plan. The Executive Director reports to the Board of Directors.

The Executive Director's responsibilities include:

Strategic Leadership:

- Develop and implement a strategic vision for the Latino Academy of Workforce Development in alignment with its mission and goals.
- Provide leadership in guiding the organization towards enhancing workforce development and education opportunities for the Latino and non-Latino community.

Program Management:

- Oversee the design, implementation, and evaluation of Workforce Development, Education, and Leadership and Wellness programs that address the needs of the community.
- Ensure programs are effective, culturally sensitive, and contribute to the overall mission.

Fundraising and Development:

- Lead fundraising efforts to secure financial support for the organization's programs and initiatives.
- Cultivate relationships with donors, sponsors, and grant-making organizations focused on workforce development and Latino empowerment.

Financial Management:

- Develop and manage the organization's budget, ensuring financial sustainability and responsible resource allocation.
- Provide regular financial reports to the board and stakeholders.

Board Relations:

- Collaborate with the board of directors to set strategic priorities and ensure effective governance.
- Keep the board informed of organizational developments and seek their input on key decisions.

Community Engagement:

- Represent the Latino Academy of Workforce Development to external stakeholders, including government agencies, community partners, and businesses.
- Build and maintain positive relationships within the community and other relevant networks.

Advocacy and Public Relations:

- Advocate for workforce development and education policies and opportunities that benefit the Latino community.
- Oversee public relations and marketing activities to promote the organization's impact and success stories.

Staff Management:

- Recruit, train, and manage a diverse team, fostering an inclusive and collaborative work environment.
- Conduct performance evaluations and support professional development for management team members.

- Successful nonprofit development experience, including grant writing, donor stewardship, and cultivation of corporate partnerships/sponsorships.




- Demonstrated ability to collaborate and multi-task.

Madison, Wisconsin is a vibrant city of over 250,000 residents. Its Dane County metro area is home to over 560,000 residents, making it Wisconsin's second largest metro, after Milwaukee.

Madison is the capital of Wisconsin, a world-class <u>research & technology university</u> city, and a thriving creative-class hub.



Nestled on a chain of scenic lakes, the Madison region has been home to the <u>Ho-Chunk nation</u> for over 11,000 years. Its Ho-Chunk name is <u>Dejope</u>, meaning "Four Lakes." The region has the world's largest concentration of <u>Indian effigy mounds</u>. There are dozens on the University of Wisconsin-Madison campus alone.

Madison is consistently named a <u>best place to live</u> in US nationwide rankings and surveys. Madison earns accolades for its <u>green</u> & <u>healthy</u> lifestyle, its <u>gender parity at work</u>, its <u>family-friendliness</u>, its <u>sports</u>, its <u>great beer</u> scene, even its <u>happiness</u>. Madison's local economy and job market are among the strongest in the US. Dane County (metro Madison) had just 2.5% unemployment. (Compare to unemployment rates of 2.6% statewide and 3.5% nationwide). National and global companies headquartered in metro Madison include Epic Systems, American Family Insurance, Exact Sciences, Lands End, TruStage, Promega, ETC, and Sub-Zero.

Madison has a vibrant nonprofit sector. Locals like to say Madison has the most nonprofits per capita of any US city. (Don't tell them this report ranks Madison #2!)

With a median home cost of \$337,500, Madison offers a lower cost of living than many desirable metros.

Madison's racial and ethnic demographics: 73% non-Hispanic White, 9% Asian, 7% Hispanic, 6% Black, 5% other.
